About this document

The 25 health geographies in this series are the RTS which is the French-language acronym for the Réseau territoriale des services which correspond to the CISSS and CIUSSS territories.

- Its aim is to contribute to the vitality of English-speaking communities of Quebec by building strategic relationships and partnerships within the health and social services system to improve access to services.


The NPI program


One-page summaries

- A series of definitions is included and can accompany each one-page summary.


Quebec - Total Population, 2011




RTS du Bas-Saint-Laurent - Total Population, 2011




RTS du Saguenay - Lac-Saint-Jean - Total Population, 2011




RTS de la Capitale-Nationale - Total Population, 2011




RTS de la Mauricie-et-du-Centre-du-Québec - Total Population, 2011




RTS de l'Estrie – CHU de Sherbrooke - Total Population, 2011




RTS de l'Est-de-l'Île-de-Montréal - Total Population, 2011












RTS de l'Outaouais - Total Population, 2011




RTS de l'Abitibi-Témiscamingue - Total Population, 2011




RTS de la Gaspésie - Total Population, 2011




RTS de Chaudière-Appalaches - Total Population, 2011






RTS de Lanaudière - Total Population, 2011






RTS de la Montérégie-Est - Total Population, 2011

Definitions

<u>Educational Attainment</u> – Persons with low educational attainment are those with only a high school graduation certificate or less while those with high educational attainment are those with a university bachelor's degree or higher.

<u>Income</u> – Persons with low income are those with individual income less than \$20k while those with high income reported \$50k or more. This includes income from all sources.

<u>Low Income Cut-off (LICO)</u> uses the income levels of a given family and considers how large a share of its income is spent on necessities such as food, shelter and clothing. If the amount a family spends is 20% higher than an average family in a year, it falls into the low income cut-off category. People who live below income cut-offs may be said to live in "straitened circumstances." (Human Resources and Skills Development Canada, August 2009.) Low-income after-tax cut-offs (LICO-AT) is used in this report.

<u>Recent Inter-provincial Migrants</u> – are persons who have moved into Quebec from another Canadian province between 2006 and 2011

<u>Recent Immigrants</u> – are persons who have moved into Quebec from outside Canada between 2006 and 2011. <u>Out of the Labour Force</u> Persons not in the labour force are those who, during the reference week, were unwilling or unable to offer or supply labour services under conditions existing in their labour markets (this includes persons who were full-time students currently attending school).
